

On May 10, 2011 the Robert E. Lee Soil & Water Conservation District hosted an agricultural field day on two farms located in Campbell County, VA. Participants learned about various agricultural conservation practices installed through state and federal cost-share programs. Some of the practices included: stream fencing to exclude livestock with alternative watering sources, stream crossings, cross-fencing for rotational grazing, stream-side tree buffers, and no-till drill machinery. Agency personnel shared information and updates on local, state and federal Ag. cost-share programs.
